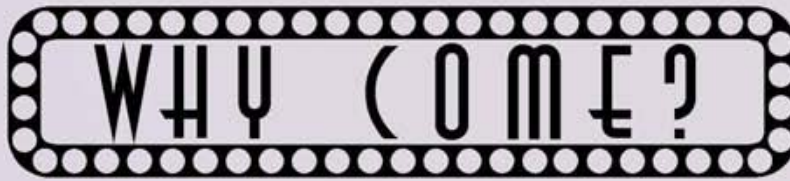

After returning from the NAAUC 2010 Conference, delegates will have been given exclusive insights into college life and a renewed enthusiasm for college leadership. They will also walk away with new ideas to help your Student Clubs in areas such as:

- *Event organisation*
- *Running O-Week*
- *Operating your committee professionally*
- *Accounting, college legalities and incorporation*
- *Building community spirit*
- *Mental health issues*
- *Responsible service of alcohol*
- *New and exciting social functions*
- *Improving relations with your administration for your mutual benefit*
- *Inter- College relationships and their benefits on college environments*

Delegates will also return home with:

- Genuine **solutions** or methods for dealing with college problems such as pastoral care, personal conflicts, inefficiencies, legal issues and apathy.
- Established **contacts** with other students and a support network for the exchange of ideas and **information** across colleges.
- Personal **experience** in **leadership** relevant areas, gained through key note speakers, interaction with other students and workshops.
- A formal **Conference Report** produced after the conference with records of all the information gathered from guest speakers, workshops, role development and discussion groups.
- **Motivation** and commitment to go back and make a difference in your college with a support network behind you.
- For most, the Conference is a once in a lifetime opportunity that has to be experienced to be believed. It will change the way you look at colleges, universities, education, and yourself. It will lead you to question your social, cultural, and environmental beliefs, morals, and standards. The lessons learnt will prepare you as a future leader in society enabling you to empower those around you to unite, and ultimately you will be able to facilitate a superior college environment.

SELECTING DELEGATES

It is suggested a minimum of two delegates represent your college, as it is impossible for an individual to attend even half of the workshops and discussion groups where most information on colleges is accumulated. It is even harder once the delegate returns to college to grasp all the opportunities he/she has been made aware of, as he/she will simply not have the required support. The more residents you send the more opportunities your college will be able to take hold of.

Here are a few suggestions for selecting your delegates:

1. If your residence has a student club, the President should take the first place. Presidents have the experience and knowledge of their colleges to utilise the relevant information. They are also in the best position to implement improvements on their return.
2. An active and hardworking member of the Student Club (if applicable) who will return to college next year. The committee can elect this representative. If your residence does not have a student club, we recommend any hardworking leader who will return the following year.
3. Many colleges send three or more delegates that range from first years to senior tutors.
4. Don't discount previous delegates!

However, all good delegates possess motivation, initiative, discipline, and are outgoing and proactive in attitude. Many colleges obtain funding from the student club, college administration, the university and through fundraising. To send more delegates, it is becoming increasingly popular for delegates to contribute to their costs.

Send someone who will make a return on the investment that your college will make in sending him or her. It's going to be a great week, so send great people! Each college will be sent a Marketing Kit with a detailed procedure on how to choose the best delegates for your college. WHY SEND A RETURNING DELEGATE?

When deciding how many delegates to send and selecting individual delegates, keep in mind the benefits of sending a past delegate as a Team Leader, including:

- More information is taken in by all your delegates and more quickly: they are more likely to ask their Team Leader questions rather than strangers.
- More information is taken in by the particular delegate: they know how the seven days work, what the Association is about, what the executive and working party do, and the format of the conference; these individuals will excel in their appropriation of the academic content.
- Fast-track networking: the Team Leader knows the executive and past delegates and can introduce your delegates to them (networking is a very powerful post conference tool).
- Can co-ordinate your team to get the most out of the conference, directing them in the areas your college needs the most help with.

In return for sending them to the conference, they could:

- Be responsible for compiling a post-conference report;
- Organise a new, community-focused initiative at your college which they take away from the Conference;
- Organise a presentation of the report within a month of semester 2 beginning;
- Help select the other delegates; and
- Co-ordinate the registration and payment of all delegates.

SECURING FUNDING

The Annual Conference is the highlight of the NAAUC year. Hundreds of delegates from colleges and residences around Australia gather together for a week to discuss relevant issues, exchange ideas, and socialize. Funding delegates can be an area of difficulty. There are a number of Costs involved, including:

- *Conference fees;*
- *Transport expense to and from the conference; and*
- *Ancillary costs, such as for social events, merchandise and general spending.*

From a funding point of view, costs can be minimized by ensuring that your college or residence is a member of the Association. The annual membership fee is lower than the loading per delegate on the conference fee – thus it makes sense to join NAAUC! Delegates can attend at a discount rate, and your college or residence gets all the benefits of membership.

The two largest costs are the conference fee and the transport expense. These are typically funded by a combination of the student club, the College or residence administration, and if necessary, the delegate personally. For example, three-quarters of the cost may be paid by the student club and administration, and the remainder by the delegate. Ancillary costs are generally funded by the delegates personally.

It is always worth approaching your **head of college** for financial assistance in sending delegates to the conference. It is also possible to supplement funding by holding a fundraising event within the college or residence. External sponsorship is always an option.

BIDDING FOR NAAUC

Hosting a NAAUC conference is an excellent opportunity for your college, university and city to let their true colours show. By organising over 200 delegates to come and stay in your college for a week, visiting delegates will learn the traditions and leadership styles and the unique aspects of your college.

It is also a great way to advertise your college. Putting on a professional seven-day event is a great experience. While it sounds daunting, you have an active and excellent support base in over ten Life Members, heaps of past executives, working party members, and delegates as well as many tools to make organizing one of Australia's premier young leader conferences as easy as possible. More than

20 people are directly and intensely involved in the making of an annual NAAUC conference. There is no better feeling than standing in front of 200 people, watching them intently listen to an amazing speaker, and saying to yourself "I was a part of this". It is a wonderful feeling, knowing you have helped many colleges and people throughout Australia to improve, even if only a little.

PREPARATION

Preparation is the key. Almost always, the winning college is not the one with the most exotic location, or exciting social calendar, but the college that has proven its organizational skills by presenting a well laid out, informative and concise presentation.

APPROACH THE COLLEGE ADMINISTRATION

Conferences are a vital part of generating revenue for a college and keeping residents' fees down. Most administrations would be only too happy to host the conference, especially as they have an early booking (one year ahead!). Get a quote for accommodation and dining costs during the week and maybe a written letter of support from your Head of College or another relevant person.

GAIN SUPPORT AND SPONSORSHIP

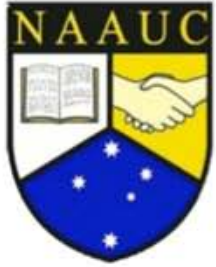
Support can be obtained from the local council, university, college office, local government and local and national businesses. This can be in the form of a direct financial contribution or free/discounted products and services to be used during the conference. Conferences are of considerable financial benefit to whichever state and region is playing host - if you 'sell' the idea of the conference to them, they will often come forward with money or some other form of support.

OTHER AREAS

Other areas that should be researched and included in the presentation are potential speakers, workshop topics, venues and social functions. A professional presentation using videos or PowerPoint can be an advantage.

Access Scholarship

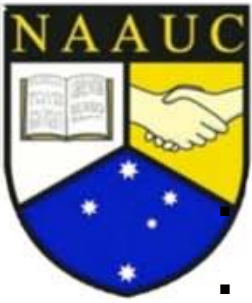
- An **international tertiary student** living at a college or hall of residence in Australia for the duration of 2010.

GETTING TO EMMANUEL

To get from the **airport** to Emmanuel College, NAAUC **shuttle buses** will once again be running to and fro on the day of registration and possibly the evening before (depending on delegate times of arrival). It is important that when registering for the conference you specify the exact time of arrival and departure as well as your airline and flight number so that we can best organise the bus times.

If you are too excited for NAAUC, or arrive outside of the NAAUC shuttle bus pick up times, then catch a taxi from the taxi rank directly outside the airport straight to Emmanuel College, or catch a bus or train to Central Station, then a bus to St Lucia. Taxis from the airport to Emmanuel will cost about \$30 to \$40. Tell the driver to take you to Emmanuel College, Sir William Macgregor Drive in St Lucia. If the driver is struggling say it's at UQ and they should be able to find it.

For those wishing to **drive** to the conference, Emmanuel has a few parking spaces available throughout the conference. It's best to contact us before you drive to UQ so we can know for sure that you have a car park secured on arrival.

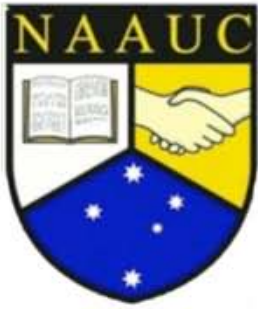
Step 4): Pay your bond on arrival

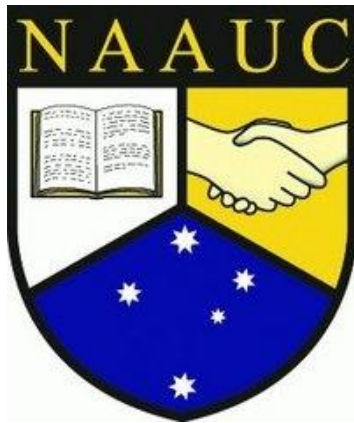
